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LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT 👘



Once again, I am honored to present the annual Joint Special Operations University (JSOU) Factbook for Academic Year 2014 (AY14). This detailed synopsis of our many academic programs, course results, and student demographics provides an accurate snap-shot of JSOU capability and direct support to our SOF Enterprise. It is intended for all stakeholders, so you may better assess our academic effectiveness, assist in making program improvements, and to find the right academic programs for your organizations and people.

In this academic year, JSOU surpassed the 10,000 student mark for the first time and it was the fifth consecutive year of increasing student attendance in our academic programs. As stated in prior reports, this number is not significant without a comparable increase in student contact hours, which

increased by 19 percent over the previous year and has steadily increased by approximately 20 percent each year during the entire period. AY14 is also the first year we have collected data on students attending JSOU's fully online courses, accounting for 25 percent of this growth. Support to Professional Military Education institutions continues to be a JSOU mainstay and contributes another 40 percent to overall student numbers. It should be noted that resident course attendance declined by 14 percent, the first decrease in five years, and is attributable to low first quarter numbers as budget uncertainties and travel restrictions were the norm.

Responding to the increased academic demands of our community, JSOU added 10 new resident courses in AY14, increasing our total course offerings to 55. Of these, four "dual level" accredited courses were introduced, forming our first postgraduate certificate in Advanced Special Operations Studies. These courses are designed to accommodate students at the undergraduate level as well. Currently, we are converting three existing continuing education courses and developing three new courses as undergraduate electives; these will be piloted in AY15 and conducted at both our main campus and at component locations. Several new course additions were developed primarily for international students, directly supporting the security cooperation initiatives of the theater special operations commands (TSOCs). They include a Special Operations Maritime Integration course and an Inter-Ministerial Collaboration course. Mobile education team (MET) events maintained relatively constant attendance although greater emphasis was placed on TSOC requirements and partner nation support. Overall, we educated almost 2,000 international students in 79 METs and seven resident courses.

Outstanding progress was made in SOF enlisted education programs. The fully online SOF Enterprise Management course was added as the final course in the four course series forming the SOF Noncommissioned Officer Career Education Program. Enrollment in each of these courses continues to grow as indicated by the significantly increased enrollments for AY14 in all JSOU Enlisted Academy courses (including those fully online). I expect this will remain a trend as the word spreads about their positive impact and relevance of the curricula. Of benefit to all, JSOU piloted a Systemic Operational Design course for SOF (formerly offered through the SOCOM-J5). As the JSOU faculty gains a deeper understanding of this valuable curriculum, we intend to offer this course more frequently throughout the command as a CAPSTONE course within a SOF operational planning sequence.

In AY14, JSOU completed its organizational realignment into a true university structure. This is proving to be a sound decision and a significant first step for JSOU's future development. Our courses are becoming increasingly more focused on higher levels of student learning while our academic processes are rapidly paralleling the academic standards found in major civilian universities. Unfortunately, it does not look promising this year to receive authority to confer degrees and the level of accreditation allowed for JSOU remains uncertain. However, JSOU will continue its priority programs of NCO education; continuing education for the USSOCOM Head-quarters, components and the TSOCs; security cooperation programs for TSOCs; professional military education (PME) support; and continue its foundational efforts in SOF-specific undergraduate and postgraduate courses. JSOU will continue to build strong partnerships with selected SOF "friendly" civilian colleges and universities that can assist our community in applying JSOU course credits toward a variety of degree programs.

In early AY16, the university will move into its new academic facility, significantly advancing our contribution to SOF's intellectual readiness and our status within the academic community. Progress on the building is proceeding as planned and its proximity to USSOCOM Headquarters will be an added benefit. Features such as an expanded research library, multiple classrooms of various sizes, assorted breakout rooms, a SCIF classroom and wireless connectivity will posture JSOU to begin a new era of academic excellence in a dedicated, high tech academic facility specifically designed for 21st century learning.

Please review this Factbook and see how JSOU supports your mission. I look forward to hearing from you and together, continue to build an outstanding and unique SOF institution.



Faculty and Staff

To accomplish its mission, JSOU employs an extremely diverse workforce, all of whom are hired or assigned under a variety of staffing programs. The staff and faculty include active duty, active reserve, temporary duty reserve military personnel, government civilians, civilian contractors, private consultants, guest lecturers, and speakers. Simply put, the university could not perform as well as it does without the diverse efforts of all of these people.

JSOU's active-duty military personnel are assigned by USSOCOM or the service components. Reserve component military personnel serve in whatever way best supports the organizational mission as directed by JSOU leadership. Government civilians are hired through the U.S. Civil Service personnel system and nongovernment civilians are hired in accordance with appropriately submitted and funded contracts. Adjunct faculty and guest speakers/lecturers are hired as needed to support specific educational requirements.

Active-duty and reserve-military personnel typically are assigned to specific education support requirements, i.e., to act as course directors or subject-matter experts, but some are assigned to support mission and unit administration positions. Government civilians and civilian contractors also fill education and support roles. Personnel funding is obtained from standard and nonstandard sources. For example, reserve personnel positions are not funded by JSOU, but some civilian staff positions are paid for with limited grants or unfunded requirement requests.

All faculty members attend the Methods of Instruction Course (MOIC) or an approved substitute course. MOIC prepares JSOU faculty members and other selected SOF instructors to develop and teach curriculum while creating active learning environments focused on higher levels of learning through the use of various teaching methods. The curriculum is based on the Joint Professional Military Education Instructional Systems Design (ISD) model applied in the joint SOF environment. Instructors are categorized as: instructor, senior instructor, and master instructor. Listed below are the requirements for each of the categories:

Instructor - Completed MOIC or an acceptable substitute, certification in one lesson. Active instructors will complete an annual instructor evaluation and complete 12 continuing education units (CEU) each academic year.

Academic Guidance for AY15

Strategic Objective

Continue to support the USSOCOM commander's lines of operation (LOO) through tailored and focused academic programs, adjusting as necessary for changes or updates resulting from the change of leadership. These LOOs are discussed thoroughly in SOCOM 2020. This strategic objective is further defined through the annual USSOCOM Command Education and Training Guidance (CETG), which expands educational opportunities for SOF along four lines of effort: post-secondary education, PME, regional studies and foreign language education.

General Guidance

In Academic Year 2015 (AY15), JSOU will continue the transition started in AY14, adjusting to the potential impact of revised congressional authorities and budgetary realities. JSOU will maintain its core academic and research competencies while upgrading to a nationally recognized post-graduate-level accreditation. We will execute validated post-secondary level courses while continuing to develop new electives and convert existing courses to support a bachelor's completion degree. JSOU will support all commitments to our constituents while we finalize planning and ultimately relocate to the new JSOU building. As AY15 concludes, JSOU should be fully postured to begin a new era of academic excellence in this dedicated, high-tech academic facility specifically designed for 21st century learning.

Accreditation

Accreditation is a voluntary method of quality assurance developed by American universities and secondary schools. Accreditation is primarily used to distinguish schools adhering to a set of educational standards. The accreditation process also is known in terms of its ability to effectively drive student performance and continuously monitor the improvement of students within the educational system.

Although accreditation is a set of rigorous protocols and research-based processes for evaluating an institution's organizational effectiveness, it is far more complex than that. Accreditation examines the whole institution, including the programs, the cultural context and the community of stakeholders, to determine how well the parts work together to meet student needs. In 2009, JSOU was granted a five-year accreditation with the Accrediting Council for Continuing Education & Training (ACCET). ACCET reviews educational institutions based on the quality of educational opportunities they provide. The evaluation process includes a self-evaluation, an on-site peer review and an independent review of the educational process.

ACCET was founded in 1974 for the purpose of improving continuing education and training, and has been officially recognized by the U.S. Department of Education since 1978 as a "reliable authority" as to the quality of education and training provided by the institutions it accredits. In 1998, ACCET became the only recognized accrediting agency to be certified as an ISO 9001-Quality Management System under the international standards established by the International Organization for Standardization and continues to hold that unique status.

Accreditation serves the interests of companies, agencies, and the public through the establishment of standards, policies, and procedures in conjunction with an objective third-party professional evaluation designed to identify and inspire sound education and training practices. When such a process is matched by an institution's commitment to high standards and accountability, a partnership for quality becomes reality. Note: ACCET only accredits to the lower division undergraduate level.

AY14 Highlights and Accomplishments

USSOCOM's mission has evolved rapidly since September 2001, as has the need for an innovative and educated special operations force. For more than fourteen years, JSOU has been working to integrate and transform the educational mission and academic processes to accommodate the ever-expanding changes in the world of special operations. During AY14,

JSOU currently has articulation agreements with Excelsior College, St. Leo University, University of South Florida, Norwich University, and The University of Charleston, WV. These selected institutions have independently evaluated JSOU coursework as equivalent to the learning outcomes contained in selected college-level undergraduate and graduate-level courses. All partner schools affiliated with JSOU have met the following benchmarks: regionally accredited, SOF and military-friendly, offer tuition rates within the tuition assistance cap, offer completely online degrees, and have flexible admission requirements.

The Curriculum Management Division oversaw the development of curricula for 13 new courses, major revisions for three courses and general maintenance for 39 courses. In an effort to maximize contact hours and maximize college credit, several courses were converted from traditional face-to-face instruction to a blended (part online, part traditional) format. Also in AY14, JSOU achieved its goal of having a Blackboard presence for all 55 JSOU courses.



College of Special Operations

In response to the USSOCOM commander's education guidance for JSOU to "pursue the ability to confer undergraduate and graduate-level credits and degrees," the Professional Studies Department was reorganized to become the College of Special Operations.

The college retained responsibility for supporting special operations-related content in officer PME by providing resident expertise, adjunct faculty, and revised case studies, which directly supported SOF electives in both service and joint intermediate and senior colleges. The College of Special Operations continued to host U.S. and international PME visitors to USSOCOM Headquarters. In AY14, those two categories of educational support touched 4,652 students and provided nearly 17,000 student contact hours.

The USSOCOM Library continued its dual mission of research support to the headquarters staff and JSOU faculty and students The library increased access to databases with relevant research materials to special operations and added electronic book access to SOF worldwide. The library staff continued to teach research methods to students in multiple JSOU courses and taught copyright law and compliance procedures to faculty members.

The most substantive change to the newly formed College of Special Operations' responsibilities was from support to externally focused advanced education initiatives for individuals - for example, managing the Special Operations Legislative Affairs program for USSOCOM - to a college concentrating on courses valuable to the force and recognized as upper-division undergraduate or graduate-level credits to other colleges or accrediting agencies. In AY14, four courses encompassing the evolution, strategic utility, employment, and networking of special operations to the interagency and international community were designed and piloted. Taken in combination, they equate to a graduate certificate in Advanced Special Operations Studies. Several of JSOU's existing courses were revamped to meet accrediting assessment and evaluation standards at the undergraduate level. Additionally, a curriculum workshop with the service components helped identify future course content which, with existing faculty resources, could be designed and piloted to become future core and elective courses.

Enlisted Academy

In AY14, the Career Education Program (CEP) for enlisted SOF provided joint professional military education to more than 400 personnel in the grades of E6 through E9. The Joint Special Operations University-Enlisted Academy (JSOU-EA) is comprised of four courses that cover the full continuum of SOF enlisted education from the tactical to the strategic level.

The four courses are: Joint Fundamentals, Enterprise Management, Joint Special Operations Forces Senior Enlisted Academy (JSOFSEA) and Summit. Funding for the courses is provided through the Five-Year Defense Plan (FYDP), and USSOCOM Program Objective Memorandum facilitated educational initiatives for the joint enlisted special operator.

The Joint Fundamentals Course continues to target the SOF operators and enablers at the entry level. Taught exclusively through distance learning (DL) over an eight-week period, five times a year, the course objective is to develop skills in written, oral and visual communications, generate creative ideas, and evaluate ethical decision making. Students also analyze the history, unique function and the organization of the USSOCOM enterprise, from the headquarters to the subcomponent commands.

The pilot course of Enterprise Management was successfully completed in Tampa during the second quarter. The course provides asynchronous educational learning over eight weeks through DL. Students in the grade of E7 are introduced to organizational leadership and management, the role of USSOCOM at the unit level and preparing for increased leadership roles in the joint environment. Conducted five times annually, the course is already recognized as a premier course for the senior enlisted SOF NCO.

JSOFSEA continued as the premier senior enlisted academy for the SOF "Warrior Diplomat." JSOFSEA conducted four courses, supporting the USSOCOM commander's second line of operation to expand the global SOF network. JSOFSEA continues as a two-phase course providing an academically rigorous curriculum to SOF warriors, preparing them for assignments at the joint level. Focusing on mission-oriented leadership, communications, organizational management, and strategy in each phase, JSOFSEA continues to gain recognition throughout the world for producing a better prepared SOF operator and enabler to lead in any environment.

The Summit Course provides SOF and selected conventional force senior enlisted advisors facilitated learning in missionoriented leadership and strategic thinking skills, preparing them to effectively advise, lead, and mentor at the operational and strategic level. The course is conducted twice annually with a projected enrollment of 12 students per course. The Summit Course is taught in a blended learning format: eight weeks online followed by three weeks of resident and externship learning. Thanks in part to the team of instructors, designers and facilitators, each JSOU-EA course is recognized by several colleges for academic credit. Students enrolling through the Admissions Division Office can earn 13 to 15 college credits for Joint Fundamentals or Enterprise Management upon successful completion. The institute successfully conducted the CAPSTONE and APEX PME events, providing SOF-specific education to newly minted general and flag grade officers and senior executives, respectively. As directed, the institute transitioned those PME events to the College of Special Operations and integrated the Preparation of the Environment Orientation Seminar (PEOS), which prepares SOF for specific duties in support of TSOCs. Also integrated were emerging educational requirements to educate the SOF community regarding analysis, influence, and mission command in planning for unconventional warfare operations. Also integrated was the Combatting Terrorist Networks Seminar (CbTNIS), which educated senior career personnel expecting assignment to positions concentrating on combating terrorism with SOF, interagency and international organizations. The institute continues to expertly support multiple other educational operations, including interagency, irregular, and international instruction at home and abroad.

International Engagement

In AY14, the International Education Division transitioned to the Institute for Global Operations. This transition responded to a JSOU directive for the Center for Continuing Education to re-engineer its resources to better support JSOU's vision. The Institute for Global Operations continues to, "employ education as a strategic tool to achieve USSOCOM and TSOC objectives and promote deeper understanding among U.S. and international SOF." The Institute for Global Operations continued to receive high demand signals from the TSOCs and the components for residential courses and METs.

The Institute for Global Operations offered 12 different international education courses that were taught in the target language, tailored, delivered in partner countries, regional or bilateral in focus and supported the TSOCs special operational forces and security sector development plans. All resident courses were taught in English. Mobile education was delivered primarily in English, Spanish, French, and


Arabic. The Institute maintained its academic rigor while offering a diverse curriculum.

In AY14, the Institute for Global Operations continued to align its methods of instruction by offering teaching opportunities to our critical and global core partners in support of SOCOM's Line of Operation #2 (Strengthen the Global Network). The impact of these opportunities was best illustrated during two Special Operations Combating Terrorism (SOCbT) interations in Africa, in which the class participants consisted primarily of senior operational and strategic level officers. The majority of students had experience combating terrorism at home and abroad as members of various African Union (AU) or United Nations (UN) peacekeeping operations. This regionally focused event was a great opportunity to engage these key senior officers from across West Africa, including presidential and ministerial-level advisors. Additionally, senior military and ministerial personnel were identified to support future courses; hence the Inter-Ministerial Collaboration Course now resides in the Institute for Global Operations Division.

In AY14, the Institute for Global Operations partnered with the National Intelligence University (NIU), and the Center for Civil Military Relations (CCMR) at the Edelweiss Conference Center in Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Germany, for the Countering Violent Extremism Continuing Education Symposium. The purpose was to re-engage international alumni from the NIU, CCMR, and JSOU in order to foster enduring relationships with combating terrorism professionals in the security sector. The content focused on countering violent extremism in Europe, Africa, and the Middle East; encouraged interagency coordination to promote a common intellectual framework in the field of countering violent extremism; and allowed these professionals to network with their peers, who have graduated from other DoD schools.

The CANSOFCOM PDC Symposium took place 3-4 December 2013 in Kingston, Canada. More than 100 participants discussed ways to shape joint SOF education curricula to advance a SOF global network. The theme, "By With and Through: Executing the SOF Global Engagement Strategy," focused on future integration and interoperability necessary to achieve strategic aims. The partnership between American and Canadian special operators reflects a heritage rooted in the elite World War II combined commando unit, the 1st Special Service Force, also known as the Devil's Brigade. A special highlight included honoring three veterans on the 70th anniversary of the Monte la Difensa operation. In partnership with the CSOSR, the CANSOFCOM PDC published a monograph to summarize and expand on the symposium's line of exploration.

NATO Joint Senior Psychological Operations Seminar In conjunction with the Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe, JSOU was the host for 70 senior representatives from 18 countries at the NATO Joint Senior Psychological Operations Seminar in Tampa, Florida, from 10-13 December 2013. The theme for this seminar was, "Measuring Effects in the Human Domain," and presentations were organized to elicit discussions concerning salient issues for doctrine, training and leadership within the NATO Psychological Operations (PSYOP) community.

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JSOU Press

JSOU Press is the publishing arm of the CSOSR. Established in April 2005, JSOU Press is largely identified through the line of JSOU Press-branded monographs. During AY14, JSOU Press published 11 monographs authored by JSOU Senior Fellows, PME students and other scholars on topics relevant to the joint SOF community. In addition, JSOU Press published the third edition of the Special Operations Forces Interagency Counterterrorism Reference Manual, which serves as a quick reference for counterterrorism professionals throughout the interagency structure, and the Special Operations Research Topics 2015 publication, which will influence and guide SOF-relevant research throughout academia, think tanks, and professional military education institutions.




Data Validity



AY14 Student Demographics by Service and Method of Instruction





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

End-of-Course Evaluations

At the end of each resident, JSOU-EA, and MET course, students are asked to indicate the extent to which they agree with the following overall course evaluation statements:

Each student response is rated on a five-point scale, ranging from strongly disagree, or 1, to strongly agree, or 5. Lesson-by-lesson and overall course feedback results are collated, analyzed, and reported to the course directors. The overall score reflects the mean of the responses for the five end-ofcourse evaluation responses. The university average is shown in the last row of the table. This information is also included with each course description on the pages that follow. Evaluations of supported PME, pilot courses, and unique/tailored educational events are not included in the university average.



Non SOF: A person whose skill, function, or specialty is not essential to the successful conduct of a special operations core objective.







COLLEGE OF SPECIAL OPERATIONS Irregular Warfare Advanced Course




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

COLLEGE OF SPECIAL OPERATIONS Irregular Warfare Course

This is an intermediate course analyzing prevailing concepts, theories, and challenges of the complex operating environment in the 21st century, selected supporting activities, and primary activities of irregular warfare. The key lessons include critical thinking, geopolitical complexities of contemporary conflict, historical lessons of political-military theory, social movement and their impacts on a nation states' sovereignty, governance, and legitimacy that incorporates nuances of emerging special operations paradigms, concepts, and theory. The course uses a blended delivery method and includes extensive readings with written responses, a group project, and a comprehensive paper.
